CARE OF CREATION TEAM UPDATES

1) Pennsylvania Interfaith Power & Light (IPL) is a community of congregations, faith-based organizations, and individuals of faith responding to climate change as a moral issue, through advocacy, energy conservation, energy efficiency, and the use of clean, renewable energy. Put more simply, IPL helps congregations think about energy usage as a matter of stewardship.

From May 1-6, Jon Brockopp, a member of Grace Lutheran, will lead a group of IPL bicyclists for the 4th annual bike trip from State College to Washington, DC — 200 miles in 4 days. The cyclists connect with communities and people of faith, led by low-emissions example, and share PA IPL's work and mission. The trip ends with a visit to Pennsylvania offices on Capitol Hill to communicate the message that climate change is a moral and ethical challenge that must be addressed by individuals, communities and congregations, and also our elected leaders, working together in active hope. Karl Raynar will be joining this year's group on 80 miles of the ride from McAlevy's Fort to Hagerstown. The goal is to raise \$9,000 among the 13 riders. 2) Another effort has been underway in partnership with Groundswell, a consortium of non-profits in MD, DC, DE, and PA, to promote wind energy. Trinity is currently under a two-year contract for power provided solely by wind. In fact, our rate is cheaper than our previous plan.

M.S. Awareness Week recently ended but that doesn't mean we will stop trying to find a cure. This is a cause that is very significant to me. Four years ago I was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis. I was training for my first marathon when my legs went numb. After months of trouble shooting, the doctor was able to confirm my diagnosis. This came as a shock. Initially I wanted to keep the information to myself, and not tell people (for fear of being treated differently). I told only my closest friends and family, but after giving the information some time to settle and spending the weekend in the hospital for my first treatment to get feeling back in my legs I realized how important friends, family, and sup-



port from others are in my life and decided that I no longer was going to hide the fact that I have M.S., instead I was going to do all that I can in my power to help find a solution to this disease. I realized that is not something that would slow me down, or determine who I am.

Soon after my diagnosis, my friends, family, and friends decided to make a difference, and to bring awareness about M.S. They began participating in the BIKE MS CITRUS TOUR, which was a 100 mile bicycle ride to help raise funds for M.S. research. This is my new mission to prove to myself and to others just how strong I am by participating in BIKE MS for our fourth year.

For the fourth year a group of my friends, family, and former co-workers who are part of my team will take on this 100 mile challenge. We ride 50 miles for two days form Polk County to Orlando and back. The event is the first weekend of May this year, and all the donations collected help increase awareness and raise money to help find better treatment for M.S. and potentially a cure.

At this point the team has grown to 14 members and includes seven Orange County Public School employees. In the past three years our team has raised over \$10,000 each year. This year I have added a new challenge and my PA family and friends are willing to join in riding in the PA Keystone Country M.S. ride which is 75 miles on day 1 and 70 miles on day 2 from Hollidaysburg to State College. Some of you may know my Dad, Gene Weller, who has been running the Toys for Tots drive in Centre Country for 28 years. He's been taking the challenge with me by riding in each ride and I'm so glad for his support.

Thank you for letting me share this information with you. If you are interested in helping me raise money for my team, or would like to be a part of my bike team (I know that there are some avid bikers here who would like to step up to the challenge) please check out the following link or contact me. 2014 Centre County Toys for Tots In Review

Thanks to the extremely generous support of our community, the Nittany Leathernecks Detachment – Marine Corps League met the needs of Toys for Tots in Centre County during the 2014 holiday season. The entire process of moving all of the toys to the Penn Stater along with support materials and the retrograde of remaining toys to the "unregistered site" went more smoothly than could have been expected. As a recap, the following milestones were met:

- 1352 needy children identified by the seven county food pantries and the PA State Police with their Foster Child Program received four toys per child.
- An additional 499 children were provided four toys per child between the food pantries' cut-off date and December 23rd at the "unregistered" site after comparing the names from the food pantry lists. Being unregistered meant that we could not know the numbers of children, age, or gender until the distribution was completed on Christmas Eve. This was also the sixth year that there was a sufficient amount of food donations to provide food to all in need along with toys at this site. The response for food as well as toys during the 2014 Toys for Tots campaign ensured that there was enough food for all in need. Over 5800 food items were received at the Penn Stater and distributed to the food pantries in proportion to the number of children each food pantry reported. There was also a significant number of food items delivered directly to the food pantries due to our request to collect food in conjunction to collecting toys.
- For the second year, grandparents living in Centre County with grandchildren in Centre County and below certain income levels could apply for two items per grandchild. This effort reached 282 children through the food pantries and an additional 85 at the unregistered site.
- The remaining items were dispersed among Centre County Social Service agencies to help with their program needs and will be used by an estimated 8745 additional children.
- Over 300 businesses and groups supported our countywide effort for 2014.
- There was more than 250 drop off points around the county.
- More than 1000 people came out to help wrap and label the toys over four days of wrapping, set-up day and for final clean-out of the Penn Stater.

11,000 toys collected, sorted, wrapped, labeled, re-sorted, bagged, and transported to the distribution points. An additional 4,000 toys were deliberately not wrapped as they would be used by other social service agencies after the holidays. Businesses, churches, youth groups, scout troops, campus groups and departments, fire companies, Penn State Navy ROTC, Army Reserve, Navy League of Central PA, and the Marines and their families of the Nittany Leathernecks all worked in concert to provide some "hope" to children in our community that might have lost hope if not for this community effort. I am proud of this community and what it can accomplish for the less fortunate in our midst. Thank you again for your support and we look forward to having your assistance in 2015.
