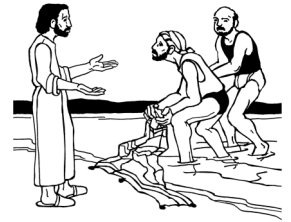

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

January 27-28, 2026

Dear Beloved of God,

What a new year we have just welcomed. My goodness, but no doubt like you, I find myself wondering what craziness will be unleashed on the US and the world today. Even more astounding is the lack of checks and balances that have protected and comforted us as a nation of decades. And now....my goodness!

In my reflections today, I come to a teaching of Jesus that I have never really pondered for current circumstance—until now!

“Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you are like whitewashed tombs, which on the outside look beautiful but inside are full of the bones of the dead and of all kinds of uncleanness. So you also on the outside look righteous to others, but inside you are full of hypocrisy and lawlessness.” (Mt 23:27-28)

Not only are there political leaders out of control but so many have combined politics with their religion, obliterating “the separation between church and state.” I have always thought of this passage about “whitewashed tombs” to refer to the religious leaders in Jesus’ day, but never our own. And yet, there is a movement of people who believe (and practice) a “might makes right” kind of civil religion under the label of “Christian.” Seems to me it is anything but Christian.

This teaching of Jesus—which is more of a critique than a teaching and definitely directed at a specific audience—is only part of the critique, of course, I encourage you to read the entire chapter of Matthew 23. Now, I recommend that with some concern for caution. One can interpret the passage and the entire chapter, as instructions of how Jesus wants his followers to deal with those we think are whitewashed tombs. Please, note, however, there is nothing in this chapter that is directed to followers of Jesus. This is definitely not a teaching for us to apply in any way, shape or form. To do so means we run the risk of doing things that would put us in the very same condition we are trying to overcome.

To the contrary, the part in the chapter Jesus does direct to his disciples is this:

“But you are not to be called rabbi, for you have one teacher, and you are all brothers and sisters. And call no one your father on earth, for you have one Father, the one in heaven. Nor are you to be called instructors, for you have one instructor, the Messiah. The greatest among you will be your servant. All who exalt themselves will be humbled, and all who humble themselves will be exalted.” (vv 8-12)

The entire critique of the religious leadership is included, at least in part, I believe, to demonstrate to us followers how we are NOT to live. To counter today’s whitewash tombs is the same approach Jesus taught, “be the people of God.” Our task is to be Christ’s hands and feet in the world. As Keith Green included in one of his songs: “Just keep doing your best and pray that it’s blessed, Jesus takes care of the rest.”

While we cannot avoid judging others’ behaviors, we are not to judge what is in their hearts, their motivations or intentions. That is Jesus’s job. That said, we are not called to give up our civil rights to speak freely, to worship as we wish, and to protest or object in ways that do not violate the law.


So, I do encourage you to be who you are and to practice your faith as you see fit, which is to say the way the Holy Spirit so inspires, equips and empowers you to do so. We may all do so differently and still all be faithful. For my part, as long as I am a parish pastor, will continue to do what I have been called to do, preach the Gospel, celebrate the sacraments rightly—which means to do so in ways that enact the Gospel, care for people in need, and pray.

Many times, of late, I find hope in those simple faith practices. After all, the inference in Matthew 23 is that the rightful Judge, Jesus, “will come to judge the living and the dead.” What a relief I do not have to do that! We do what we can to the best of our ability and let Jesus take care of the rest.

Despite the terrible and frightening current events in our world, Jesus’ promise at the end of Matthew is a wonderful assurance of hope: “And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.”

Just so, we pray, “Come, Lord Jesus!”
